

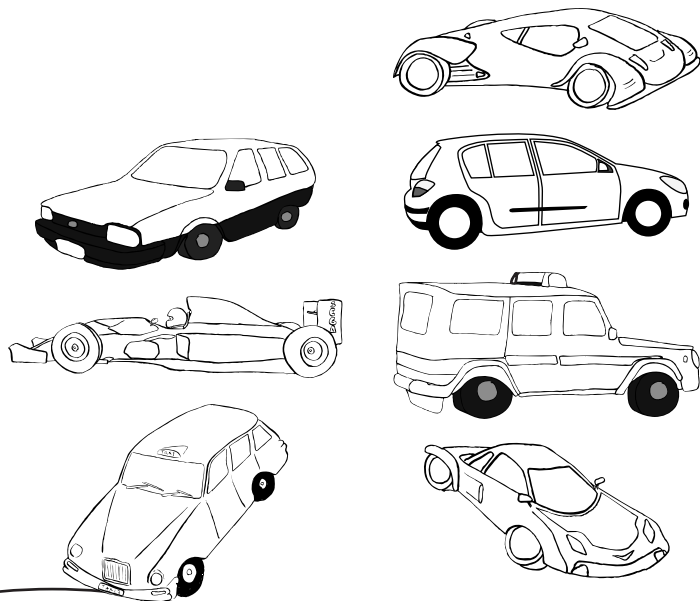
What to do...

1. Look for seven things – seven toy cars, seven teddies, seven books, or seven...
2. With a partner, work out different ways of sharing these.
3. Think of a good way of recording – drawing or writing – each way. Can you be sure you have all the ways of sharing these!
4. Try eight things. How many ways are there of sharing these between two of you? ($7 + 1$, $6 + 2$...)

Sharing seven

This activity helps your child learn the pairs of numbers that make 7, e.g. $3 + 4$, $2 + 5$, $1 + 6$. Extend the activity to help them learn the pairs of numbers that make 8, or the pairs that make 9. Learning these addition pairs is very important.
